Following are some of the jobs typically open to RC graduates with concentrations in Art History. The list is by no means exhaustive, so think of it as a starting point—a source of ideas from which you can branch out and discover at least a few of the things you might enjoy doing. Be sure to read the section on "Recommended Preparation" for suggestions on extra curricular activities, jobs and other experiences which will enhance your employment prospects. If you have questions about any of the occupational fields, talk to a faculty member in Art or to a staff member in the Career Services Office. And if you think you are interested in a career not included on the list, do not let that worry you. Every person has his/her own personal reasons for deciding to major in Art History and an equally personal plan for how to apply that education to a career field.
